

Mod Podge a Picture Frame

Supplies

- Unfinished Frame
- Mod Podge (Matte or Satin)
- Printed Scrapbooking Paper
- Acrylic Paint
- X-Acto Knife
- Scissors
- Foam Brush
- Paint Brush
- Foam Board or Cardboard



Directions

1. Take the back of the frame off to remove all the contents, leaving just the frame.
2. Using a paintbrush, paint the outside edges of the frame, including the inside edge of the opening with an acrylic paint that color coordinates with the printed scrapbooking paper.
3. Set aside and let dry.
4. Trim the paper with the scissors to fit the front of the frame.
5. Remove the back of the frame.
6. Place the printed scrapbooking paper onto cardboard or foam board.
7. Place the frame face down on top of the paper so that you can trim the opening
8. Use the X-Acto knife to cut along the edges of the opening.
9. Once done, use the foam brush to apply Mod Podge to the entire area you will be placing the paper.
10. Carefully, place the paper onto the frame, smoothing out any wrinkles.
11. Seal it with a thin layer of Mod Podge. Set aside to let dry.

You can also add embellishments to the frame, such as: Rhinestones, Letters, Flowers, Stickers, Lace, Ribbon, Glitter, Bows, Beads.

9. Repeat steps 1-6 until you have enough rolls to create your design. For our wooden panel, it took about 80 rolls.

Billie Jo wanted to add mirrors to this project, so she glued them onto the panel with E-6000. Adding embellishments is optional, but if you do, keep in mind that you will be laying magazine rolls around them, which may affect your design.

10. Apply a layer of Mod Podge onto the area of where you are going to start laying down the rolls, which for us, is a corner of the panel.

The starting point is crucial to the design, so be sure you have an idea of the pattern of the rolls before you begin to trim and glue the rolls.

11. Place one end of the roll into the corner to measure how much will fit, then cut with scissors.

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
